

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Description and Outcomes

The Bachelor of Science in Emergency Management program is designed for emergency services personnel, as well as emergency and disaster management personnel, and addresses the challenges in disaster planning, disaster response, technology, human resource management, and fiscal responsibility. Private and public sector employers are demanding higher levels of training and education for those who lead our nation's emergency management response teams during catastrophic disasters, terrorist incidents, and typical emergencies. This bachelor's degree is designed to empower you to pursue leadership roles in modern emergency preparedness, disaster planning, and disaster response organizations. Additionally, this program could help increase your administrative and management knowledge as well as awareness of occupational and life safety challenges impacting the emergency management discipline.

If you have already completed an associate's or bachelor's degree from an accredited institution, you may be eligible for degree requirements to be waived and replaced with advanced start credit. Concentration

You can personalize your degree with a concentration in business foundations. The business foundations concentration will allow you to gain competencies in the fundamental concepts of business administration. You will develop an understanding of the four functions of management, the components of a marketing strategy, and the financial performance of an organization.

Program Length

The Bachelor of Science in Emergency Management program consists of a minimum of 180 quarter credit hours. Upon successful completion of the program, you will be awarded a bachelor of science degree.

1. Ethics: Evaluate ethical, social, civic, cultural, and political issues that have a direct impact on the discipline of emergency management and disaster planning services.
2. Global Awareness: Analyze the social, cultural, behavioral, and economic characteristics of global emergency management and disaster planning.
3. Knowledge Base: Develop a comprehensive program for operational, strategic, and tactical emergency management decisions and disaster management planning.
4. Psychology: Examine issues that deal with the social as well as individual psychological effects of emergency management and disaster planning and response.
5. Research Methods: Evaluate research about the management and practical application of emergencies and disaster planning using quantitative and qualitative analytical tools.
6. Technology: Evaluate the use of technology to inform operational, strategic, and tactical emergency management and disaster planning decisions.
